



AUSTRALIA'S SUPPORT TO THE 2022 FLOODS IN PAKISTAN

In response to devastating floods in Pakistan in 2022, Australia provided A\$10.2 million in immediate humanitarian assistance. This helped to address emergency food, nutrition and livelihoods needs for more than 800,000 people, including for women and children who were disproportionately affected by the disaster.

Food assistance through World Food Programme (A\$5 million)

With Australia’s support, the World Food Programme provided food assistance to address the immediate needs of flood-affected communities across Pakistan. Australian support helped reach more than 275,000 people in 24 districts in Sindh, Balochistan, Punjab and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa provinces.

Nutrition and livelihoods support through CARE and the Shifa Foundation (A\$1.5 million)

Through the Australian Humanitarian Partnership, CARE and the Shifa Foundation supported more than 84,000 people in Matiari District, Sindh, providing nutrition services to almost 60,000 people and supplementary feeding to more than 6,000 malnourished children. They also provided targeted cash assistance, supplies and training to help improve livelihood opportunities.

Nutrition services through the UN Children’s Fund (A\$3.5 million)

With Australia’s support, the UN Children’s Fund provided lifesaving nutrition services for children aged under five, adolescent girls, and pregnant and lactating women in flood-affected districts of Balochistan and Sindh. This helped to detect and treat wasting in young children, preventing wasting-related mortality. Australia’s support helped more than 500,000 people.

Rahnuma Family Planning Association of Pakistan (A\$200,000)

Through Australia’s global partnership with International Planned Parenthood Foundation (IPPF), the Rahnuma Family Planning Association of Pakistan (R-FPAP) reached almost 20,000 flood-affected women and girls with emergency reproductive health services in Kachhi and Sibi Districts (Balochistan), Muzafargarh District (Punjab) and Badin District (Sindh).
